



Grant Opportunities and Updates

[University Partnership Program Department of Transportation 69A345 Office of the Under Secretary for Policy](#) **Deadline: Feb 27, 2023.** The Departments of State, Commerce, and Transportation; National Science Foundation; USAID; USTDA; and others have launched 20 projects to improve transportation, water and resource reuse, and health system capacity for cities in the ASEAN Smart Cities Network (ASCN). The three main goals of the USASCP are to: 1) Promote U.S. private sector engagement in smart, sustainable city solutions and advance capacity of urban service delivery in ASEAN; 2) Share best practices and technical collaboration among U.S. cities, universities, and industry leaders with their counterparts in the ASCN; and 3) Strengthen the digital economy and cybersecurity capability in ASCN cities. The USASCP: UPP will be funded as a cooperative agreement for an initial period of two years funded at \$590,000.

[Legal Education Diversity Pipeline Intervention Grant Program](#) **Deadline: LOI (required): March 1, 2023, by 11:59 PM ET. Full proposal deadline: July 28, 2023, by 11:59 PM ET.** Provides funding to programs and initiatives aimed at helping college students and/or college graduates from historically underrepresented groups successfully matriculate into law school and the legal profession. The central goal of the Diversity Pathway Intervention Grant Program is to increase the knowledge base around effective methods for increasing the enrollment and success of law students from historically underrepresented racial, ethnic, and socioeconomic backgrounds. Accordingly, we seek to fund collaborative programs that provide participants with meaningful content and experiences as well as holistic support. Have a duration of 12–24 months and seek funding in the amount of \$200,000–\$300,000.

[Building Early Childhood-Child Welfare Partnerships to Support the Well-Being of Young Children, Families, and Caregivers Department of Health and Human Services Administration for Children and Families - ACYF/CB](#) **Deadline: March 13, 2023.** Grant funding will support the development of policy, quality practice, and other strategies across systems that work to support children and families at-risk or engaged with the child welfare system. Grant recipients will implement strategies to ensure that coordination and communication between relevant partners becomes institutionalized. Such strategies may include, but are not limited to: establishing formalized mechanisms of coordination between partner agencies; increasing cross-training and partnership opportunities for child welfare and ECE at both the staff and leadership levels; developing and enhancing strategies to facilitate referral and coordination processes between agencies; and ensuring that child welfare agencies have ready and accurate information about ECE.

[NSF Secure and Trustworthy Cyberspace](#) **Deadline: Proposals Accepted Anytime.** The SaTC program welcomes proposals that address cybersecurity and privacy, drawing on expertise in one or more of these areas: computing, communication, and information sciences; engineering; education; mathematics; statistics; and social, behavioral, and economic sciences. Proposals must be submitted pursuant to one of the following designations, each of which may have additional restrictions and administrative obligations as specified in this program solicitation. CORE: This designation is the main focus of the multidisciplinary SaTC research program. EDU: The Education (EDU) designation is used to label proposals focusing on cybersecurity and privacy education and training. TTP: The Transition to Practice (TTP) designation will be used to label proposals that are focused exclusively on transitioning existing research results to practice. CORE and TTP proposals may be submitted in one of the following project size classes: small projects: up to \$600,000 in total budget, with durations of up to three years; and medium projects: \$600,001 to \$1,200,000 in total budget, with durations of up to four years. EDU proposals are limited to \$400,000 in total budget, with durations of up to three years.

[Cultural Grants Program Department of State U.S. Mission to Slovenia](#) **Deadline: March 14, 2023.** The Embassy continues to offer grants for well-designed and managed projects that encourage and promote cultural and artistic cooperation, collaboration and exchange between the United States and Slovenia. Proposals should focus on the following: Programs that build and enhance relationships between Slovenia and the United States through bilateral cooperation, promote shared heritage and values, and promote mutual understanding; Programs that engage audiences by using a broad set of means to showcase America as a diverse society that values inclusion. For example, cultural programs where an American artist participates or is celebrated, programs that reach young people, and programs that raise awareness on important topics, like promoting human rights (to include tolerance, respect for diversity, and support for historically marginalized communities) and/or youth engagement, volunteerism, and active citizenship; Sustainable projects with strong merit and clearly defined goals and outcomes; Projects that include acknowledgement of U.S. Embassy support and a plan to amplify our cooperation via traditional or digital media. Funding: \$100,000.

[BJA FY 23 The Kevin and Avonte Program: Reducing Injury and Death of Missing Individuals with Dementia and Developmental Disabilities Department of Justice](#) **Deadline: March 20, 2023.** OJP is committed to advancing work that promotes civil rights and racial equity, increases access to justice, supports crime victims and individuals impacted by the justice system, strengthens community safety and protects the public from crime and evolving threats, and builds trust between law enforcement and the community. With this solicitation, BJA seeks to support local jurisdictions' efforts to reduce the number of deaths and injuries of individuals with forms of dementia, such as Alzheimer's disease, or developmental disabilities, such as autism, who, due to their condition, wander from safe environments. Award Ceiling: \$150,000.

[NSF: Pathways into the Earth, Ocean, Polar and Atmospheric & Geospace Sciences \(GEOPATHs\)](#) **Deadline: March 27, 2023.** GEOPATHs invites proposals that specifically address the current needs and opportunities related to education, learning, training and professional development within the geoscience's community through the formation of STEM Learning Ecosystems that engage students in the study of the Earth, its oceans, polar regions and atmosphere. The primary goal of the GEOPATHs funding opportunity is to increase the number of students pursuing undergraduate and/or postgraduate degrees through the design and testing of novel approaches that engage students in authentic, career-relevant experiences in geoscience. In order to broaden participation in the geosciences, engaging students from historically excluded groups or from non-geoscience degree programs is a priority. Estimated funding is \$400K.

[NIJ FY23 W.E.B. Du Bois Program of Research on Reducing Racial and Ethnic Disparities in the Justice System Department of Justice](#) **Deadline: April 10, 2023.** NIJ seeks proposals that include robust, creative, and multi-pronged dissemination strategies that include strategic partnerships with organizations and associations that are best equipped to ensure that research findings lead to changes in policies and practices related to the subjects of study. Special consideration will be given to proposals that dedicate at least 15% of the requested project award funding toward implementing such strategies, as demonstrated in the Budget Worksheet and Budget Narrative. NIJ will give special consideration to proposals with methods that include meaningful engagement with the people with lived experience of the subject of study; including, but not limited to, justice practitioners, community members, crime victims, service providers and individuals who have experienced justice system involvement. Award Ceiling: \$2,000,000.

[Drug-Free Communities \(DFC\) Support Program- NEW \(Year 1\) Department of Health and Human Services Centers for Disease Control – NCIPC](#) **Deadline: April 11, 2023.** The purpose of the DFC Support Program is to establish and strengthen collaborations to support the efforts of community coalitions working to prevent and reduce substance use among youth. The DFC Support Program has two goals: 1) Establish and strengthen the collaboration among communities, public and private non-profit agencies, as well as federal, state, local, and tribal governments to support the efforts of community coalitions working to prevent and reduce substance use among youth (individuals 18 years of age and younger). 2) Reduce substance use among youth

and, over time, reduce substance use among adults by addressing the factors in a community that increases the risk of substance use and promoting the factors that minimize the risk of substance use. This funding opportunity will fund applicants who have never received DFC funding.

[NIJ FY23 Research on the Abuse, Neglect, and Financial Exploitation of Older Adults Department of Justice](#) **Deadline: April 13, 2023.** NIJ seeks proposals for research and evaluation projects in four topical areas: 1) evaluation of programs that seek to prevent, intervene in, or respond to the abuse, neglect, and financial exploitation of older adults (age 60 years or above); 2) research on individuals who abuse older adults; 3) research on poly-victimization in older adults; and 4) research on fraud and financial exploitation of older adults. Applicants must submit proposals that address one of the four topic areas. Applicants are encouraged to propose multidisciplinary research teams to build on the complementary strengths of different methods and areas of subject matter expertise. NIJ also seeks proposals that include consideration and measurement of issues of diversity, discrimination, and bias across age, gender and gender identity, race, ethnicity, religion, and sexual orientation, as applicable. Estimated Funding: \$1,500,000.

[NIJ FY23 Research and Evaluation of Services for Victims of Crime Department of Justice](#) **Deadline: April 13, 2023.** NIJ seeks applications for rigorous research and evaluation projects in three topical areas: 1) evaluation of programs that provide services for victims of crime; 2) research on supporting victims of community violence; and 3) financial costs of crime victimization. Applicants must submit proposals that address one of the three topic areas. Applicants are encouraged to propose multidisciplinary research teams to build on the complementary strengths of different methods and areas of subject matter expertise. NIJ also seeks proposals that include consideration and measurement of issues of diversity, discrimination, and bias across age, gender and gender identity, race, ethnicity, religion, and sexual orientation, as applicable. Estimated Funding: \$3,000,000.

[BJA FY 23 Connect and Protect: Law Enforcement Behavioral Health Response Program Department of Justice](#) **Deadline: April 24, 2023.** BJA seeks to fund cross-system collaboration programs that improve or enhance public safety and public health responses to and outcomes for individuals with mental health disorders (MHDs) or co-occurring mental health and substance use disorders (MHSUDs) who come in contact with law enforcement. BJA provides grant funding to help entities prepare, create, or expand comprehensive plans and then implement these collaborative projects to target preliminarily qualified individuals. BJA will only accept applications that demonstrate the proposed project will be administered jointly by an agency with responsibility for criminal or juvenile justice activities and a mental health agency. Funding: \$550,000.

[Research and Development National Endowment for the Humanities](#) **Deadline: May 16, 2023.** The National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH) Division of Preservation and Access is accepting applications for the Research and Development program. This program supports projects that address major challenges in preserving or providing access to humanities collections and resources. Research and Development offers two funding tiers to address projects at all stages of development and implementation. Program Funding: \$1,500,000.
